



First Junior badge, Senior badge, HPOF, DPC, Original, Preservation, SGCV, Certified Race Car, Annual Grand National or Senior Grand National badges are given out as won. Do you remember those miniature DAV license plates?

I remember years ago when we'd receive these miniature replicas of your car's license plates in the mail. You'd put them on your key chain so that if you ever lost your keys, they could be returned to you. Do you?

In 1941, the DAV purchased the Ident-O-Tag Co., which apparently had been making these tiny license plates for sale since about 1938. The DAV also convinced various state motor vehicle departments to send them their license plate registration lists.

Then, hoping for a contribution in return, they would annually send out what are now commonly called "DAV Tags" -- tiny license plates about an inch and a half long that not only matched the number on your car's real plate, but also mimicked the colors and design each year as well.

As you correctly remember, recipients would put one of these on their key chains. If the keys were ever lost, hopefully someone would drop them in a mailbox and they would be sent to the DAV in Cincinnati. The DAV then would match the state and number and return them to you.

I remember these like yesterday because my dad would wait for them every year as he would a Christmas gift. Funny thing was, though, he didn't put them on his key chain. No, he'd simply hang them on a pegboard on his workbench for decoration. So, in a cigar box somewhere around my house, I'm sure I have decades of miniature Illinois plates.

And, you know what? I hadn't thought about it before you called, but it appears I'm sitting on a small gold mine. On eBay, I see hundreds of these being offered for anywhere from a couple of bucks each to \$35 for an unopened envelope



from the DAV -- even \$155 for a set of Illinois tags from 1950 to 1971.

But, sorry to say, the plates stopped coming after 1971, according to Dr. Ed Miles at www.davnews.com, where you can see an extensive collection of tags from Illinois and the rest of the country. Just as it's more difficult to find information on someone in the hospital, privacy laws also nixed the DAV tag largesse.

Of course, that was just about the time Illinois quit sending out new plates every year. That's right, those under 35 wouldn't remember, but we used to get new license plates for our cars every year until 1979. Now we simply add a new sticker until, like last year, my sticker would no longer stick. So, I've been driving around all year with it in my glove compartment in case I'm pulled over. I'm hoping for better glue next year.

In Illinois, by the way, license plates were first issued in 1907. For \$2, they were supposed to last the life of the car, but you know politicians - in 1909, it was changed to an annual fee. For more year-by-year plate history, go to www.cyberdriveillinois.com and search for "history."

And, yes, somewhere around my garage I also have an Eckert's fruit basket filled with my dad's old plates, too. Unfortunately, I inherited his pack-rat gene.

Legislative Actions Pertaining to Our Hobby

Being aware of proposed national/state legislation and local ordinances that may affect our car hobby is an important aspect of protecting our rights as hobbyists. During 2012 and continuing into this year, certain legislative actions had or will have the potential of being either positive or negative to our hobby.

Some of the positive legislative action that occurred in 2012 now allows residents in Pennsylvania to display the year of manufacture license plate on their respective vehicle. This passage allows a more authentic look to the vehicle and provides an answer to a bystander's question, "What is the year of that old car?" Many states already allow the display of the year of manufacture license plate on an antique vehicle and now Pennsylvania is included in the list.

Also, the state of Michigan passed legislation in 2012 that allows residents during the month of August to enjoy recreational driving. Under the previous law, use of a historic vehicle was limited to club activities, tours, parades, etc. I believe that this will provide more exposure of our collector cars to the general public and enhance our hob-by and hopefully increase AACA membership.

Some of the negative proposed legislative actions that occurred in 2012, that may be reintroduced in 2013 include the following:

1. Increasing the vehicle registration quali-

fication year

- 2. Increasing the vehicle annual registration fee
- 3. Increasing the restrictions pertaining to the vehicle usage
- 4. Increasing the restrictions pertaining to the storage of parts or non-operable vehicles (more restrictive local ordinances may be passed)

As I have mentioned in previous Rummage Box articles, an excellent way to keep informed about pending legislation both nationally and on a statewide basis is to join the Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) Action Network. This network (SAN) is comprised of a variety of car hobbyists and car groups/clubs who desire to promote and protect legislation that affects our hobby and associated industries. In addition, SAN provides you a listing of your representatives.


I encourage each Region/Chapter to designate in 2013 a Legislative Representative to monitor proposed legislation by joining SAN. No costs are involved in joining and this network provides via email various updates and alerts regarding proposed legislation both from a national and statewide basis. You can join by simply accessing the website www.semsan.com and clicking on the "Get Involved" tool bar.

I continue to encourage everyone to stay abreast of proposed legislation and get involved in the process of communicating your opinions and views with your respective representatives. It is everyone's responsibility to protect our rights pertaining to our enjoyment of this wonderful hobby.
